

## Risk Avoidance

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- Students must wear a gown when examining cadaveric material. Green moisture-resistant gowns are preferred over cloth lab coats because they are non-absorbent and when worn-out they can be discarded. 'Moisture-resistance' minimises the risk of a student's normal clothing becoming contaminated. It is not appropriate for clothing contaminated by embalming chemicals and human material to end up in the domestic system. These gowns are Armani originals and for a small investment, your's can be individually monogrammed by Mr Armani's personal appointee. Incidentally, Mr Armani cites the use of this particular shade of green, as 'uplifting' in what he has termed the 'rather unflattering' laboratory environment.
- Students must wear closed in footwear at all times. Non-compliance will result in punitive measures. For a first offence the 'perp' will be required to wear pink rubber boots for the duration of the class. A subsequent infringement will result in expulsion from the lab. Remember the Garden of Eden?!
- Gloves are provided and must be worn at all times when examining prosections and osseous material.
- Goggles are provided in the lab. Their use by students while using cadaveric material is now mandatory.
- Hand washing before leaving the lab is mandatory. Failure to undertake this simple procedure or to execute it satisfactorily will result in a buzzer sounding as you attempt to leave the lab.
- Spills must be cleaned up immediately. There is a mop and bucket out the back. Learn to use it!
- All accidents must be reported and an accident report completed. See one of the technical staff.
